### FOOTPRINTS IN TIME

## Up-Valley Holiday Feasting in the 1880s

In the early 1870s, Lillie Hitchcock Coit, separated for life from her philandering husband, Howard Coit, settled at the ranch she called Larkmead, located on Larkmead Lane near the Silverado Trail. Her parents, Charles and Martha Hitchcock, lived close by at a ranch called Lonely, situated along Ritchie Creek in the forested hills to the west of St. Helena Highway.

Martha kept a running record of life in the Upper Napa Valley with daily journal entries. Drew Sparks and Sally Kellman drew on the journals to compile *A Salon at Larkmead: A Charmed Life in the Napa Valley* (Ten Speed Press, 2000). The text is also sprinkled with recipes from Lillie's *Recipe Book*, written circa 1870–1880 (housed in the Bancroft Library, UC Berkeley). The book's photos and text convey a sense of what ranch life was like in the late 19th century, and there was food aplenty!

According to her mother, Lillie led "a charmed life"; Larkmead was often filled with guests, and parties lasted for days. Holidays were no exception. The following quotations are from holiday and Christmas times occurring between 1881 and 1895.

‡ *Christmas Day! It dawned pleasantly upon us all. Cook made a garland of evergreens and Christmas berries for the dining room at Larkmead, and Eugenie made wreaths and hung them.* (p. 135)

‡ *Found Lillie in the kitchen teaching the new cook to stuff the turkey. I dressed it with fringed paper and pink ribbons and rosebuds. To roast a turkey: Clean and wash the bird. Make a stuffing with one pound sausage meat, 1 cup bread crumbs, tablespoon of boiled onion cut fine, black pepper and salt to taste, tablespoon butter, 1 egg beaten well, half a can chopped truffles. Cover the turkey with pork (salt fat) cut thin, tie it on, then tie up the turkey in a sheet of well buttered letter paper. Bake for three quarters of an hour. Then take off the paper and finish baking, basting every five minutes until done.* (p. 87)

‡ *We had a splendid dinner. Oysters and salmon trout and an entree of foie gras and the great turkey which was perfectly cooked with cranberries and celery and sweet potatoes, and three squash pies which Lillie made herself, and a great plum pudding blazing blue with brandy, all of which went to the servants, who had a good dinner in the kitchen with all the wine they could drink.* (p. 135)

‡ *We had champagne frappe and a large pound cake. . . . She responded by saying, "let's take a drink," and the champagne poured like water.* (pp. 131, 133)



## New to the *Collection*



One important accession in 2011 was a suitcase of photos and archival material from the St. Helena Catholic Church. They were found by Deacon Bob Little in the garage behind the rectory during the earthquake retrofit and remodel in 2009. After construction was completed and church members began putting things away, they came to the conclusion that the Historical Society would take care of this collection better than if it was once again stored in a garage.

The photo shown above was probably taken in 1987 during the church's centennial celebration. The two altar boys are Jaime Velazquez (left) and Dominic Beltrami. Father Brenkle, stands behind them to the left. Father Serado, standing behind Velazquez, can barely be seen.



Another important accession this year was a series of old postcards depicting St. Helena scenes, donated by Carolyn Kelperis. The postcard above shows the Hotel St. Helena sometime in the 1920s.

## SOLDIERS OF ST. HELENA HONORED BY SHHS AT THE LIBRARY



On the evening of Thursday, November 10th, the Historical Society held an event at the library commemorating the lives of those from the St. Helena area who died in five wars. Mariam Hansen (shown at left) presented her research on these victims of war, who were as follows:

- *World War I:* Giulio Brovelli, Dayton Gardner, Harry Groteguth, Ervin Hurd, Bernard Korte, Theodore Lyman, and Arnold Maggetti
- *World War II:* Robert Bergendorff, Dwight I. Brown, Oliver Eisan, Paul Engeli, Robert Glos, Dodge Lincoln, Ervin McMillen, Leander Paulich, and Henry Rutherford, Jr.
- *Korea:* Robert Jursch
- *Vietnam:* Robert Flannery, Jr., Jack Lanelli, Dan Long, Lawrence Peterson, and Gary Rodrigues
- *Iraq:* Darrik Benson

Victor Cole, a veteran from World War I, was also featured in the talk. He was born in St. Helena and served in France.

Jacky Young gave a brief history of Paul Galleron's internment experience in Russia during World War II, based on his war diary (donated to SHHS), and recent interviews.

Audience members filled in background about what

life was like in World War II: rationing, blackout curtains and neighborhood wardens checking for lights at night because St. Helena was in the "fly zone," victory gardens, knitting clothing for the troops, rolling bandages, gathering scrap metal, and working in defense industries.

The discussion was enhanced by exhibits put together by Susanne Salvestrin showing photos and articles from local newspapers of World War II soldiers. On display in November was the actual World War II footlocker and contents brought home by Master Sergeant Edwin H. Learned (donated to SHHS).

Society historians are interested in information you may have about other soldiers from the St. Helena area who served during wartime.
